They provide support, information and advice to build knowledge and skills; liaise with stroke clubs, community and recreational groups; and network in the community to ensure a stroke survivor's family and carers are getting the right services. Everyone is affected by stroke differently and so the job is very varied. CSAs provide everything from education, goal setting and advocacy, to encouragement, empowerment and emotional support.
